Both sessions were followed by interactive Q&A segments, where participants engaged enthusiastically with the speakers, reflecting a deep interest in the subject matter.

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

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## Report on Waste and E-Waste Management Seminar

### Introduction

A seminar on **Waste and E-Waste Management** was conducted at **PMC College of Education** to spread awareness about sustainable waste disposal practices and the growing concerns of electronic waste. The event was attended by students and faculty members.

Dr. Ritu Malhotra welcomed **Mr. Santosh Kumar Gupta** from **DMSWSL under MCD**, who highlighted the alarming increase in e-waste due to excessive use of electronic gadgets. He explained the harmful effects of improper disposal of e-waste, such as soil and water contamination, and suggested sustainable solutions like recycling and refurbishing old devices.



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## Key Issues Discussed

### 1. Urbanization and Waste Management

With rapid urbanization, the challenge of waste management has intensified. Speakers highlighted that **low-lying areas are being filled with waste**, affecting drainage and leading to sanitation issues. The **legacy waste problem** was also discussed, emphasizing the need for proper landfill management.

### 2. Consumerism and Waste Generation

Consumerism has played a major role in increasing waste, particularly **plastic waste, e-waste, and textile waste**. Experts emphasized:

- The need to **purchase high-quality, durable products** instead of frequently replacing items.
- The importance of **repairing and reusing products** to reduce landfill burden.
- Promoting a **minimalist lifestyle** to prevent unnecessary waste accumulation.

### 3. E-Waste and Hazardous Waste Management

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The growing **e-waste crisis** was a key discussion point. Batteries, tyres, and electronic devices are often discarded improperly, causing pollution and health hazards. The seminar emphasized:

- The importance of **proper e-waste recycling facilities**.
- Awareness of **hazardous waste disposal guidelines**.
- Encouraging **producers to take responsibility for e-waste disposal** through the Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) initiative.

## Challenges in Waste Disposal

### 1. Mismanagement by Authorities

Experts highlighted inefficiencies in waste management by local authorities. Some of the key issues included:

- **Irregular garbage collection**, leading to piles of waste on streets.
- **Sanitation workers (Zamadaars) dumping sewage onto roads**, causing traffic congestion and health risks.
- **Lack of enforcement of waste disposal regulations**, allowing indiscriminate waste dumping.

### 2. Unsafe Waste Disposal Practices

One of the most concerning practices discussed was **residents throwing garbage from balconies into garbage tractors**. This irresponsible behaviour has resulted in:

- Health risks due to exposure to open waste.
- Increased risk of injury to pedestrians and sanitation workers.
- Pollution in public areas due to waste spillage.

## Proposed Solutions

To address these issues, the speakers suggested several solutions:

1. **Promoting Composting** – Organic waste should be composted instead of being dumped in landfills. Households and communities should adopt composting methods to reduce waste generation.

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2. **Stricter Waste Management Laws** – Local authorities should **impose fines on improper waste disposal** and ensure regular waste collection.
3. **Better Public Awareness** – Conducting campaigns to educate residents on proper waste disposal practices and encouraging responsible consumer behavior.
4. **Implementation of the 311 App and Helpline** – Encouraging citizens to report waste management issues through platforms like the **311 app** and the **Swachh Bharat Helpline (1800-2031-460)** for swift action.

## Conclusion

The seminar concluded that **effective waste management requires collective efforts** from the government, communities, and individuals. The speakers urged for **better enforcement of laws, sustainable consumer habits, and proper e-waste disposal facilities** to ensure a cleaner and healthier environment. Participants pledged to adopt responsible waste disposal practices and spread awareness about sustainable waste management solutions. The seminar successfully instilled a sense of responsibility among students to contribute towards a cleaner and greener environment.



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## Report on One day Seminar

### Topic - NTeQ model in education
